Dear Members and Friends of Union Presbyterian Church,

Once upon a time there was a little iceberg. Each day the little iceberg just did what it did everyday: it woke up, floated around a bit, talked to friends, went to work, ate dinner. Little did anyone know that under the water, the little iceberg wasn't so little. The little iceberg carried a whole lot of ice baggage with it. If you really watched you might see how all that extra ice wearied the little iceberg and slowed it down. Maybe you could see how it's baggage sometimes affected those around it. But the extra ice was under the water. It was mostly invisible. Then one day, the little iceberg met the Titanic...

It would be silly to tell the story of the Titanic from the perspective of the iceberg. Icebergs don't have feelings and the fact that 90% of icebergs are under water is a function of how ice floats not about "hidden emotional baggage" icebergs carry. However, I believe that most of us could probably relate to this fictional story of the iceberg. You and I can easily find ourselves carrying all sorts of stuff under the surface mostly hidden but ready to hurt ourselves and others. And what is scariest is the fact that I don't think that we have to carry all that baggage.

It's easy for us to become like icebergs in our lives. Part of the problem is in our society. In "The Holy Longing: The Search for a Christian Spirituality," Ronald Rolheiser writes about just how different most Western Civilizations are today from the past. Cultures long ago and even in our own country a short time ago were different. They more easily saw a connection between that natural world and the spiritual. They were more explicitly religious. They had a whole lot more religiously based rules to follow. There was a clearer understanding how what one did during the day connected to what went on in their hearts and souls.

Rolheiser writes that this didn't necessarily make these cultures better. They had their own problems. They were more superstitious, legalistic, and uptight. They often had unhealthy notions of fate, and excessive fear of eternal punishment, They "...burned witches, waged religious wars, [and sometimes] slaughtered innocent people while thinking themselves on a crusade for Christ." But at the same time, "their families and communities [often] held together better than do our own and [many more seemed] less restless and slept more peacefully than we do."

Rich Vilodas in "The Deeply Formed Life: Five Transformative Values to Root Us in the Way of Jesus," explains that our society today values things that keep us distracted and focused on day to day stuff. Things that don't require us to look at our inner life deeply. Looking inward is hard and it can hurt. So if we can keep ourselves distracted in life through what we do, what we achieve, and with the practical aspects of daily living, then if something bugs us we can just complain about it a little and walk away from it. Vilodas writes that "topside, people can look content, joyful, and successful, while privately beneath they'll confess suicidal thoughts, drug addictions, marital affairs, debilitating shame, inner rage, and so much more." We end up looking like little icebergs... dangerous just below the surface.


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Fortunately, in Scripture there is an entire book of the Bible that serves as a shining example to the solution: the Psalms. All one has to do is read a couple chapters of Psalms to see that the book is full of people trying to outwardly express the deep examinations of their hearts. The same psalmists who glorify and praise God in one breath... lament and wish to be dead or the death of enemies in the next. The psalmists share their concerns, their worries, their sin, their hurts, their doubts, their fears, their rage, AND their celebrations, praise, and joy with the Lord. The Psalms act as a kind of model for how our lives could look if we stopped all the distractions and compartmentalizing and just bared all our inner selves before God. In "The Deeply Formed Life," Vilodas writes that we are called to examine our lives like this because God wants our lives to be free from all the stuff that holds us back from loving him and others. In a very real sense God wants us to dig into all that is below the surface in our lives (all the stuff that is in the dark), and to take it out so that the light of Christ can shine on it.

The bad news is that this sort of examination is hard (for all the reasons mentioned already). But the good news is that this sort of examination is not complicated. We just need to remember the word "why." What would happen if we used the word "why" as we went over our days with the Lord in prayer?

- -Why did I do that, again?
- -Why did what that one person say make me feel that way?
- -Why did that scare me? Why did that make me feel anxious?
- -Why did that fill me with such giddiness?
- -Why do I love that so much?
- -Why did I enjoy watching that person suffer a little?
- -Why did that fill me with such relief?
- -Why do I always react this way to that person?
- -Why do I seem to act that way in these kind of situations?

If we truly want to put our lives into the light of Christ, then I bet that every hour of our day has at least a small handful of things that we do and say that we should be asking "why" about with Christ. Let me give you an example. I am someone who often tears up during movies. My kids have asked me why I do it. And I've always just answered, "Well I just do." This is just the kind of answer that keeps my baggage



below the surface. Recently, I've been talking with God some about why I cry sometimes during movies. Recently, when I teared up watching a mother and child be reunited in a movie, I realized that those tears had to do with:

- -fears I have about my children not growing up healthy and happy
- -concerns I have about me and those I love being alone or ignored
- -worries I have about the world becoming more disconnected from one another.

Would I ever grow in Christ the way I want to, if I allowed these sort of worries to just remain sitting below the surface?

This month marks the start of the season of Lent. It is a time where we prepare our hearts for Christ's resurrection, reflecting on how Jesus brings light and new life into our lives. Lent is the perfect season to take some time and ask some hard "why" questions. Then maybe like the psalmists, we might get a little better at offering Christ all of our fears, doubts, pain, joy, and praise.

Ashes and Lent

In the book "The Weight of Glory," C.S. Lewis writes that all of us "... are far too easily pleased." Lewis argues that because of sin most of us notice the goodies right in front of us before we notice the unsurpassing goodness of God. Lewis believes that all of us are motivated by desire and most of us put more effort toward the things we want the most. Unfortunately, sin often causes us to focus our attention on the wrong goodies. Lewis writes that often we are like children, "who want to go on making mud pies in a slum because [we] cannot imagine what is meant by the offer of a holiday at the sea." Lewis notes: "If we consider the unblushing... staggering nature of the rewards promised in the Gospels, it would seem that our Lord finds our desires, not too strong, but too weak. We are half-hearted creatures, fooling about with drink and sex and ambition when infinite joy is offered us."

Ash Wednesday is a time for us to remember that before God we are nothing more than ashes and then Lent follows as a time to help refocus on the rightness, the bigness, and the goodness of Christ with all of who we are. This year at Union we are doing a number of things to help start the Season of Lent off right.

Special Service to Burn Ashes for Ash Wednesday

On **Sunday, February 7,** at **10:30 AM**, we plan to hold a special service to prepare ashes for Ash Wednesday between our outdoor and indoor services. We will sing hymns, burn palms (provided) and pray over the ashes. For this Sunday only, our outdoor service will begin at **10 AM** instead of 9 AM so that those coming to the outdoor and the 11 AM indoor service will be able to attend. If it is raining, this event and Outdoor Service time change will move to Sunday, February 14. Please note that we will be celebrating the Lord's Supper at both services on February 7th regardless of the weather.

Ash Wednesday

On **Wednesday**, **February 17** the imposition of ashes will be dispensed in a drive-through format in front of the church from **6:30 until 8 AM** and from **5:30 until 7 PM**. The ashes will be provided in individual containers (due to Covid 19). We will not have a traditional Ash Wednesday service. Please feel free to invite anyone you think might want to come by!

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
